At the New Year - 1901

Usually, when an old year ends and a new one begins, we review all the time that has passed and recall what we have done during that time, and make plans for how to act in the future. This kind of "contemplation" and introspection does bring benefit to us, since it forces us to see how far we still are from being a model (ideal) person, and impels us to strive for self-perfection.

Unfortunately, this introspection is not practiced by us often; we are occupied by external life to a greater extent, all of which passes for us in vanity, in cares for the earthly, for pleasure, riches, power, glory. "We strive to live like everybody lives, as it is customary in the world"--in other words, we give our time to career, business matters, receptions, trips, entertainment, etc.

Let us review our lives according to our conscience, and fulfill what the holy Church commands us to do daily before going to bed:

- 1. Give thanks to the Almighty God, since He has granted you to spend the time that has passed alive and in good health through His grace.
- 2. Have a word with yourself and examine your conscience, going over and reviewing in detail and recalling to mind if you went to see someone, what you did, what you talked about and with whom; and all of your deeds and words and thoughts recall and examine with great care.
- 3. If you did something good, think that it did not come from you, but from God Himself, Who gives us every blessing; attribute that to Him in your mind and thank Him, and pray that He may strengthen you in that good, and grant and help you do more.
- 4. If you did something wicked, say that it arose from yourself, from your weakness, or from vile habit and will; and repent and beg the Lover of Mankind that He may grant you forgiveness in that matter, and make a firm promise that you will no longer do those kinds of things.
- 5. With tears talk to your merciful Creator, that He may grant the upcoming time to be quiet, peaceful, and free from temptation and sin, for the glory of His holy name.
